Your comments on this draft decision:

G'day, it's good that a minimum FIT is required and understandable that it's tied to the wholesale price, albeit it's only a forecast. The problem for residential customers is that the retailers don't pass on the savings, instead using it to maximise their profits. Despite a recent 40+% reduction in the wholesale price, my kwh cost has not gone down. ---- although Iv'e seen it claimed that elsewhere the retail price has dropped 8%!

If the Usage charge does ever drop, you can be sure the Supply charge will go up to compensate. As long as baseload power generation remains restricted despite increasing demand, the retail price is unlikely to go down. As usual, consumers get the short end of the stick!
